Timothy Unwin is Professor of Geography and the UNESCO Chair in ICT4D at Royal Holloway, University of London. From 2001-2004 he led the UK Prime Minister's Imfundo: Partnership for IT in Education initiative based within the UK Department for International Development. In 2006, he was elected as a High Level Advisor for the UN's Global Alliance for ICT and Development. Alongside his academic research and teaching, he is Director of the World Economic Forum's Partnerships for Education programme with UNESCO.

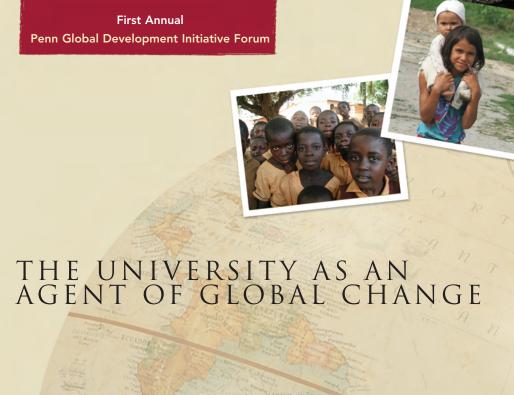
